Dear District Governors (Zones 7 & 8),

Welcome to our April newsletter . We are coming to the end of your year. For us it is the beginning of the busiest time. We will be receiving from the Australian and New Zealand Districts 55% of TRF funds in the last 2 months of the Rotary year.

Items of note for this month.

- ◆ This month is "magazine month". As you know we have experimented having regional magazine subscriptions collected by the RI regional office. It was a pilot study. After two semesters the board of RDU Regional Magazine have decided to cease the project. Both RI and RDU tried hard to make it work but the benefits expected did not materialize. There will be an official communication in the RDU magazine next month on the decision. The change back will be 1st July. The pilot will continue until June 30 2015.
- ◆ Our Director's column on the next page is quite inspirational. His page contains true words of wisdom. General Secretary John Hewko once likened it to an athletic relay team - 4 runners in the same team .
- ◆ Membership growth is positive for our Zones . Philippines is leading the way both in percentage (+11.76%) and number (+2,497). Australia is consistently growing and it is good to see Indonesia growing a positive 3.63% since the beginning of the year.
- ◆ In the Foundation segment we are three quarters through the year and seeing some great results from all areas . Annual Fund, APF and Polio Plus funds growth is very positive compared to last year . I have again put my " Cricket scoreboard" out. The leaders in the Annual Fund per capita come from across the zones .

What happens after a successful Presidents-elect Training Seminar? What takes place in a club after an euphoric District Conference? What is going on in the minds and hearts of the District Governor and the Governor-elect, the Governor-nominee and the Governor-nominee designate. At best, we expect that the four leaders will agree on broad strokes of a strategic plan and a district communication plan.

In the March 2014 issue of *The Rotarian*, President Gary said "I decided on *Light Up Rotary* because we have not done enough to show Rotary to the public. Rotary has been doing so many good things in so many communities all over the world. We should be proud of what we have done. ... we should tell people about it, that will help get more people to join in and help those who need help." Are we glowing with pride when we talk about Rotary and our projects?

At the club level, ideally packet or large group discussions would be about comparison of presidential citations to determine continuity and sustainability issues, especially with respect to partners in service; consolidation of resources and grant-seeking and fundraising; evaluation of plans, projects and performance and report making. These exercises are meant to result in improved club governance. Surprisingly, for other clubs, this has resulted in conflict --- "It's still my term," the incumbent might say. Hence, the DisCon euphoria and the PE's enthusiasm is quickly met by inertia.

This year's theme "Light Up Rotary" and next year's theme "Be a Gift to the World" have shifted focus on developing the inner self and on strengthening bonds of friendship. The change can be seen and heard in the Rotary stories. Self-disclosure promotes trusting relationships.

Radiance is a beautiful biblical word. After 10 months of giving our best, what do we radiate? Rotary is camaraderie among businesspersons. Is the club looking happier and healthier now because you have made more local and international friends? That's radiance! Paul Harris believed that if this did not happen, then "there must be something missing in our club."

Radiance is exceptional brightness and clarity that makes vision possible. In Zones 7A, 7B and 8, club visioning was advocated and underrated. In the first five years of Rotary, Paul Harris focused on defining "a philosophy of life." If there is no spiritual, emotional and professional growth in your years in Rotary, "then you may have not discovered your passion"

Recognition and gift giving time follows. Be the gift yourself to light up Rotary next year. Use your Rotary story to light up somebody's life too.

THREE QUARTERS GONE BUT JUST HALF WAY

The Annual Fund March figures were reasonable but not quite good enough to keep up with our previous 15.8% ahead of last year. We finished March just 8.1% ahead of March last year so there are signs that just maybe the cracks are starting to appear. When you consider our region's Annual Fund performance has been around an average of \$470,000 per month, you have to start wondering if the road ahead may just have a few pot-holes. We contributed something like \$1.15 million a month over the last three months of last year so you will now start to understand the size of the challenge.

The Philippines is standing tall with a YTD increase of 22.4% over the same period last year, Australia dropped a little YTD to be 20% up on last year, New Zealand is line-ball with last year and Indonesia 35% down on last year. Overall, 14 of our 39 districts are behind last year's totals but I'm sure there will be some serious discussions taking place in those districts.

We now have just two-and-a-half months left until the end of the year and we simply have to make every post a winner. Make sure you involve your Regional Rotary Foundation Coordinator, the Endowment/Major Gift Advisers, and of course your District Foundation Chair. All of these Rotarians are there to help you on the path to success so use them to maximum effect. You can also think about involving the Assistant Regional Rotary Foundation Coordinators who have so much to offer.

The top six dollar contributing districts in our region are all from The Philippines and district 3830 leads the way although down on YTD March last year. There are some great performances coming out of The Philippines at the moment and we expect the surge to continue. However, as the big guns in Australia gather for those final months I think we'll see a few changes - but don't be surprised if The Philippines continues to dominate. *(see page 4)*

PER CAPITA GROWTH CONTINUES

The overall Per Capita figure for our region stands at \$67.67 at the end on March and that's a 14% growth over the YTD March figure last year. Australian districts lead the charge with a 22% growth, Philippines and Indonesia next at 7.3% growth and New Zealand with a 4.3% growth.

There are some great individual performances and it will be an extremely competitive finish. The best in Australia is district 9520 at \$151.08. They were \$32 in front of the number two district last month but they are \$35 in front at the end of March so they certainly aren't resting on their laurels. It's good to see district 9830 back in the game after their hugely successful giving month in March which has taken them up from \$6.18 to \$53.47. Great

work!

The Philippines/Indonesia numbers are fascinating to say the least! We have five districts over the \$100 mark and another three within striking distance. I've always been willing to stick my neck out and nominate the likely winner but not this time. I reckon any one of seven or eight districts could win this one. Same story in New Zealand! The numbers might be low at the moment but just watch the changes happening over those final months.

This will be an incredibly exciting finish in all three zones. *(see page 5)*

POLIO BENEFITS FROM THE MOVIES (AUSTRALIA)

The big upsurge in Australian polio contributions is a good indication of the success of the recent movie night campaign. You'll recall from last month's edition that the night was an outstanding success and we thought anything over \$100,000 would be a great outcome. The final figure is closer to \$200,000 and while all funds have not yet been paid in, the night certainly made a big difference to the result for March.

In simple terms, Australian districts are now 34% ahead of last YTD March and that's a great result. We figure there's another load of polio money still to come in from the movie night so don't be surprised if the growth continues. New Zealand is hanging in with a slight increase YTD March and both The Philippines and Indonesia are both behind last year's mark.

The position with polio continues to improve and even Pakistan is showing good signs. The last Wild Polio Virus case reported in Nigeria was in July last year so that's almost a year polio-free. Let's hope they make it through the 12 months. There have been 20 cases in Pakistan this calendar year compared to 36 at the same stage last year and just one case this year in Afghanistan. There have been no cases reported anywhere in Africa this calendar year.

Success appears close but the funding is still critical if we are to finish the job. A 30-year campaign is a long campaign but through the efforts of many magnificent Rotarians, we are almost there. Let's not let this great victory slip away at the last moment! (see next page).

TRF AND RAWCS (AUSTRALIA)

Have you ever wondered why The Rotary Foundation and Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS) don't work together more often? Maybe it's a case of being seen as separate organisations never to be mixed, but there are many, many benefits to be had for the people we all serve. Maybe it's time for the two organisations to spend a little time examining just how this is possible and then doing something about it.

At a recent workshop in Melbourne, this topic was raised and discussed and the response was overwhelmingly enthusiastic from both sides of the table. Sure – TRF can't be part of every RAWCS project because some of the tasks undertaken by RAWCS just don't fit the criteria established by TRF (e.g., buildings). However, the really good thing about the direction RAWCS is moving is the emphasis they are placing on Rotary's six Areas of Focus so working together is now a much simpler task. Both organisations believe in the same things: the needs must be examined by the

community to ensure the project delivers what the community needs rather than what we think they need, the project must fall within one of Rotary's and RAWCS' six Areas of Focus, the project must be sustainable and the project outcomes must be measurable.

Both RAWCS and TRF projects operate through the activities of clubs so applying for a Global Grant to extend the scale of the project is a simple enough task. The application can involve one club or 20 clubs and clubs and/or districts from the project country can be part of what we do (we must have a Host Partner). Club funds are matched 50 cents in the dollar and districts using DDF will receive a dollar for dollar match. The minimum grant is US\$15,000 which means clubs can do so much more to deliver a greater level of good.

Talk to your District Foundation Chair or your District RAWCS Chair and get moving to do even more good in the world.

NEW GENERATIONS SERVICE EXCHANGE

Did you know that Rotary International offers a **New Generations Service Exchange**, an exciting opportunity for districts to engage young professionals and Rotary Alumni through a cultural exchange program for young adults under the age of 30.

New Generations Service Exchange allows young leaders to discover their strengths while using their skills to help others, in communities around the world and ultimately build their connection with Rotary. These exchanges are short-term opportunities—from a few weeks to six months—that include a strong humanitarian or vocational service element. That means that, as you learn another language and experience a new culture, you also give back by taking action in the community, learning about a profession, or serving as mentor to others.

The New Generations Service Exchange is:

- Decentralized to District level.
- Each district arranges exchanges on an individual basis with other districts – seeking out its own exchange partners.
- This is not a program of The Rotary Foundation
- For age range (18-30) that's a perfect fit for young people who are moving from university studies into their occupations
- Each district decides how many exchanges it can support
- District discusses the cost of the exchange with each participant.
- Each district can define specific selection criteria for its exchanges.
- Increased flexibility to allow individuals or

groups to participate, in a reciprocal or one-way exchange, for up to six months

- May involve selecting candidates in a certain profession, of a certain age, or who meet other qualifications.
- A strong humanitarian or vocational service element that attracts service-minded young leaders who want to experience the world
- Freedom to develop district partnerships beyond those established with Youth Exchange. You may find links following Friendship Exchanges, former Group Study Exchanges or connections built through Project engagement.
- New Generations Service Exchange can certainly be an opportunity for a young professional—or a group of young professionals—working in public health, law, or business to exchange ideas with their counterparts in another country. These criteria would be set locally.
- A program within Youth Service.

24% of Clubs in Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands and 46% of clubs in the Philippines do not have incoming officer information listed in Rotary's database. Please ask your current club officers to enter these details in MyRotary. With the changeovers

happening in July, it is imperative that these officers and their email addresses are entered in our system to ensure that communication to clubs continues with the change in club leadership.

ROTARACT AND INTERACT ARE BOOMING

What a busy month we have had! Interact, Rotaract and Rotary Community Corps (RCC) are booming throughout our zones. Below shows the activity with club charters since 1 July, 2014.
