The 2015 Manila Rotary Institute of Zones 6B, 7A and 10B has just ended. With eager anticipation, I look forward to hearing your Rotary Institutes' success stories.

The presence of RI General Officers was inspiring. RI President-Elect John, 2 Past RI Presidents Wilf and Gary, RI President-Nominee Ian, 6 RI Directors and 7 RI Past Directors had their own breakout session on the topic “Transformation of Rotary.”

There we identified organizational processes that will move Rotary forward not just as a humanitarian and membership organization, but more importantly as a peace organization. Everyone, let's think about this: How has polio transformed Rotary? My answer, we became better Rotarians, a leading volunteer organization because of audacity, passion, generosity, dogged determination and influence.

Rotary holds the highest consultative status in the UN and this is recognized through an annual observance of Rotary Day in the United Nations. Last November 7, RI President Ravi Ravindran named the six Rotary Global Women of Action for 2015 selected by Senior Rotary Leaders whose dedication exemplified “Service Above Self.” **Lucy C. Hobgood-Brown**, of the Rotary E-Club of Greater Sydney, New South Wales, Australia was among those recognized for community driven business, educational and social interventions in Democratic Republic of Congo.

How significant are the work of these six Rotarians in bringing about peace? Health care in Bangladesh; computer training to 6000 women and youth affected by HIV/AIDS in Zimbabwe; free education for 480

girls in Afghanistan; rebuilding a teaching hospital in Sri Lanka that serves 2.2 million; and education and social services to families in a garbage dump in Guatemala. The ripple and dragonfly effects of these selfless services goes beyond this lifetime.

This made me think further as we seek to recruit more women. In what unique ways can we advance Rotary's Object when we have more female members like them? I learned from my fellow directors that because of the Early Act, they have experienced success in recruiting women.

Can you imagine also how the youthful idealism of the millennial generation can energize Rotary and how we can infect them with Rotary core values as they are reshaping the economy now? Zones 7B and 8 are originators of successful new generation programs. Just imagine, too, how the new retirees can help improve sustainability of undertakings with their wisdom and legacy-orientation because they have seen it all and have learned from it?

Unity in diversity among Rotarians is the Manila Rotary Institute's success story. The visible support from the RI General Officers, sincere consideration from friends, the anonymous donations to defray costs, and the relentless and tireless initiatives of Rotarians are laudable. Every person's effort is important in a Rotary Institute. And because everything came together neatly, I am in awe.

Surely, this is the handiwork of the Almighty who just wants us Rotarians to do what we collectively do best -- *Do good in the world!*

OUR MEMBERSHIP – STEADILY INCREASING

As global growth in Rotary membership positively trends at over 1% growth this year, congratulations go to all Districts for positive outcomes. From our 37 Districts in Philippines, Australia and New Zealand, only four have experienced a decline, with all less than 0.5%.

The Philippines have again demonstrated a leading membership growth with 5.4% increase. Districts 3780 and 3810 are heading the table with over 9% at 10 November.

Both Australia and New Zealand are growing at 1.1% with Districts 9920 in NZ having increased by 4% (59 members) and 9800 (Australia) by 2.7% or 64 members and District 9640 by 3.2% (39 members) and 9685 by 2.3% (48 members). DGs across the 3 countries are striving hard for membership growth and are to be congratulated for your leadership in this area. We are certain we will achieve some excellent growth by year end.

DISTRICTS BELOW 1100 THRESHOLD

During the past year, there were two districts who were below the 1100 threshold – being D9550 and 9570 – neighbouring districts. It is really pleasing to see that District 9570 has grown its membership to 1138 continuing on the good work of IPDG Craig Edmonston. Well done DG Brian Jessett.

District 9550 has also this year made a really positive start with the magic 1,000 almost reached. DG Mike is doing extensive work with the Timor Leste community to explore opportunities for a new club.

Whilst District 9910 had dropped below the 1100 level, it is great to see this is now 1105 and we are confident it will continue to climb.

NEW MEMBER SPONSOR PINS

At the recent Rotary International Board meeting in October, the Board made a decision to cease the New Member Sponsor pin program from 1 April, 2016.

AGE PROFILES

We have now updated the date of birth data for many clubs. District 9810 now has less than 48% unreported, which is the lowest across our Zones. Your assistance in having your clubs update their details on My Rotary is really appreciated. Alternatively, we will arrange for the data entry if required.

If you are on Club Runner, can you follow through with Club Runner to sync the date of birth field to the Rotary database as this will enable the transfer of that field and update relevant age profile reporting through My Rotary.

ANNUAL FUND CONTRIBUTIONS STALL

Whatever the reason, funds coming in to the Annual Fund during October were far from the required levels and many, many districts will no doubt be searching for answers. Overall, our October performance was down 50% over the corresponding month last year and the problem was pretty evenly spread. The Philippines was down 43%, Australia down 60% and New Zealand down 50%.

Months like this come along now and then and they have the ability to upset the best of plans and totally destroy healthy expectations. The good thing is that we are now working through November which is the traditional giving month for The Rotary Foundation so the chance to pick up some of the ground lost in October is there for us all.

Needless to say, this has had a somewhat negative impact on the YTD position in all countries. The Philippines remains ahead of last year but just by the barest of margins when last month they were moving strongly. Australia has gone from being slightly in front (7%) to being well behind (minus 15%) and New Zealand has gone from being just behind to 16% down.

Clubs are the keys to everything that happens in Rotary and DRFCCs should be urged to look at each club's performance – particularly in relation to the contribution goals set, and specifically against performance at the same time last year. We have eight months to turn the ship around and that should be enough time. However, not starting to work on the problem now will certainly increase the degree of difficulty.

There are some outstanding results throughout our region and I send my thanks and congratulations to those districts. We only have 16 of our districts in front of last year and all of those 16 should take a bow.

FOUNDATION CUP CHALLENGE ON THE MOVE

We will now start talking about the *Per Capita* results which drive results for the Foundation Cups on offer in all three zones. As is always the case, last year's results were very, very exciting and there's no reason why this year should be any different.

Per Capita giving is a great way to level the playing field when small districts are competing against large districts. The larger districts will always have the advantage when it comes to total dollars contributed but the *Per Capita* system allows small districts to bridge the gap by being better on a one-for-one basis. The average giving per club member will always give everyone a good chance at success and it's a great way to drive an increase in contribution levels.

Overall, we are a little behind where we'd like to be but that's usually the case in New Zealand and Australia. On the other hand, the Philippines are fast starters and have good results early but they tend to build on that good start and go even further.

Looking at YTD October results, it's clear to see the battle is again raging in the Philippines and they haven't even had their big month of giving (November). District 3810 has jumped into the lead with a figure of \$86.80 and district 3830 is not far behind on \$63.24. The par score at this stage is \$33.33! I know from experience that things will change quite dramatically in November and it will be interesting to see the league ladder after that month has been completed.

Australian and New Zealand districts are lagging behind but things will change as we move through the year. The focus for those countries should be the districts below the \$20 mark at the end of October to see if some improvement can be recorded before it becomes "Mission Impossible"

TRF RANKED HIGH ON CHRONICLE OF PHILANTHROPY TOP 400 LIST

The Chronicle of Philanthropy has released its top 400 charities and ranked The Rotary Foundation as #93, an improvement over the past two years.

The Rotary Foundation has moved up in rank to #93, compared to last year's ranking at #94 and 2013's ranking of #126, in the Chronicle of Philanthropy's annual ranking of the top 400 non-profit organisations in the United States.

This ranking is based on monetary contributions from private sources and reflects the increasing generosity of those who support Rotary's mission .

END POLIO RESULTS LOOK GOOD

The progress made over the past twelve months should encourage us all to strongly believe that the end of our 30 year battle is very, very close. Just 52 cases of the wild polio virus being reported this year against a tally of 278 at the same time last year is proof positive that the job has almost been done. Having said that, there's still an awful lot of work to do and even with no cases the vaccination program has to go on for at least another three years. All of that will cost money and in that light it was disappointing to see the October polio contribution figures coming in at such a low level.

Regionally we are 28% down over the YTD October figure last year but that tends to mask a problem that seems to have crept into the minds of most Rotarians in Australia. The effort to strengthen our position has certainly worked well in the Philippines where a healthy increase is evident (well done districts 3800 and 3810) but with Australian contributions running at half last year's level we appear to have something of a problem.

Only three of the 21 Australian districts are ahead of YTD October last year and most are down by alarming levels. This is our program and we simply have to be in the game when the job has been finally done. Rotarians right across the world have invested too much energy into this program to walk away now so we need to re-focus our resolve and our energies to finish the job in the strongest possible manner.

It's disappointing to see that in October we had one new case in Afghanistan and another in Pakistan. In spite of this small set-back, the overall position looks excellent and the chance of the last case being reported in 2015 is still good. Let's finish the job once and for all!

2014-15 GRANTS ROUNDUP

We've closed the door on a second full year of the new grant model and there's a lot of good news to report: We awarded 1,078 global grants in 2014-15, up 24 per cent from the previous year's total. The dollar value of global grants totaled \$64.9 million.

The most popular area of focus was disease prevention and treatment, followed closely by water and sanitation. We also awarded 487 district grants, totaling \$23.8 million. And we awarded 16 scholarships, totaling about \$500,000, for study at UNESCO-IHE in the Netherlands.

If clubs are voluntarily disbanding, please contact Jennifer Coburn who can then advise as to what procedures are required for documentation purposes.

UPDATING THE MEMBERSHIP DATABASE FOR JANUARY 2016 INVOICE PERIOD

In preparation for the January 2016 Club Invoice period, please encourage club officers to update their membership details at this time and leading up to 1 January. The invoice will only be accurate to the extent that the membership is updated.

As clubs wind up their meetings before the holidays, it would be good to assess members' commitment (at least for the next six months) to their clubs at this time.

ROTARY DIRECT ENROLMENTS

Please be advised that donors enrolled in recurring giving will be provided a tax statement via automated email by the end of the fiscal year.

This means that all monthly, quarterly, semi-annual and annual credit card contributions set up in Rotary's database will no longer be sent tax receipts upon every occurrence.

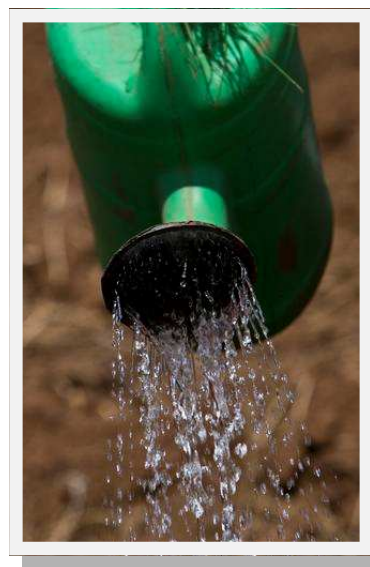


IMPROVEMENTS TO OUR GRANT APPLICATION TOOL
